INLUVACULAUINVL

Paris, Feb 24 - American First and Ninth Armies launched a large scale offensive across the Roer River before dawn today. Coordinated with Thursday's tremendous aer Marines on the American right flank crept ial onslaught against communication centers in Germany, the armies surged across the Roer River after capturing Julich Fortheest of Lachan. The Roer River line has been breached," says General Eisenhower's communique. "Progress is good. Initial German resistance was light."

The offensive was preceded by a terrific artillory barrage lasting 45 minutes. Guns were massed at the rate of 300 for every ile, and one small area east of the river was hit with 17,000 shells in twenty minutes. Hundreds of Allied bombers and fighters joined in the attack. (Continued on Page 2)

SAN BERNARDINO STRAITCEFARED

GHQ, Feb 24 - Another island in San Bernardino Strait separating Luzon from Samar was seized yesterday as American troops occupied Biri against light opposition. The islet lies a few miles northeast of Capul, captured by our forces Wednesday. These latest actions clear the main direct route for shipping between the United States and Manila.

On Luzon, the Americans advanced towards the Marikina Watershed Reservation 10 miles east of Manila, capturing Taytay and San Mateo in Rizal Province. INTRAMUROS ENTERED

ILIUUILU III IIIVU Guam, Feb 24 - As the battle for Iwo Jima raged undiminished towards the end of its first week, veteran 4th Division 300 yards forward Friday to reach the southern edge of the Japanese fighter plane base in the center of the Island.

Earlier, other Marine units using ropes and scaling ladders reached the summit of volcanic Mt. Suribachi after 28 hours and planted the American Flag on its cone. Heavy machine gun and rifle grenade fire were encountered in the advance, which bypassed large pockets of defenders resisting from caves.

MANY JAP DEAD

717 enemy doad were counted on Suribachi slope in addition to 1,222 elsewhere, for a total thus far of 1,939.

Although the Navy has been pounding the Mountain continuously, the well-protected Japanese must be dug out of their underground caves and blockhouses individually before conquest is complete. (Continued on Page 2)

TURKEY DECLARES WAR Ankara, Feb 24 - Turkey today declared a state of war existing with Germany and Japan effective 1 March. The declaration followed a warning by Britain, Russia, and the United States that only those countries who declared war before March 1 would be regarded as "associated nations" on the side of the Allies. The Turkish government admits that the declaration was made under pressure of the Big Three. Turkey has a standing army of several hundred thousand.

Moscow, 24 Feb - Two Russian armies carved new gains in Germany's crumbling eastern defenses today. Marshal Konev's First Ukrainian plunged into encircled Breslau and captured 20 city blocks. To the west, another arm of the Konev force is fighting on the appreaches to Gorlitz, second largest city in Silesia and approximately

120 miles deep in the Fatherland.

To the north, Marshal Zukov's forces cleaned Fornan, last big Polish city held by the Nazis. 48,000 Germans were killed or captured in the action which opens the main rail and highway supply line to troops attacking Frankfurt. In Pemerania, other Russian troops captured Arnswalde, sevenway road junction, 38 miles southeast of Stettin. No mention was made of fighting in East Prussia in Stalin's communique.



Turn another page in the Pacific War chronicle to a new chapter - "The Attack on the Japanese Mainland."

The carrier strike on Tokyo, the opening of Manila Bay and the invasion of Iwo Jima mark a new and perhaps final stage in the war with Nippon. From here on in, we can mount a steadily increasing naval and air attack on Honshu and the home Islands which may be in itself enough to bring Japan to her knees.

NIP NAVY HIDES

Biggest mystery of World War II is the failure of the Japanese Navy to come out and fight for its country's very existence at a time when three separate American Naval task forces were accomplishing decisive missions. And while this futile effort was being made, bombs were raining down on the Capital, hitting shipyards and factories vital to the Japs' dwindling war effort. Follow-up raids by Marianas-based B-29s furthered the destruction.

Main story of the week is being written indelibly in blood and sacrifice on the hard lava of Iwo Jima Island, 750 miles southeast of Tokyo. The battle is Saipan and Tarawa rolled into one, a gory knockout fight in a tiny eight square mile area for airfields from which we can launch a continuous steam of bombers and fighters against the heart of Japan. Already the battle is described as the toughest in Marine history, with the hardest struggles still lying ahead.

The price we must pay for Iwo is high, but achievement of the objective will find us sitting on Tokyo's doorstep. Imagine for a moment the alarm with which Americans would view an enemy invasion of Bermuda, with its threat to Washington and the East Coast .- And yet Japan is

NEW MODEL P-38 CAN DO ANYTHING

(ANS) -- A newer, faster P-38 Lightningnicknamed the "On To Tokyo" model. has just been announced by War Departments

The new pursuit-bomber - known officially as the P-38-L, carries a heavier bomb
load that the early B-17 heavy bomber. Its
fighting range has been boosted from 1.700
to 3,000 miles by auxiliary droppable gas
tanks, and its fire power has been increased. The ship could be able to operate from
pases on Iwo without difficulty.

575 MILES PER HOUF

According to the Army, the "On To Tokyo" nodel can carry 4,000 pounds of bombs — that's 50 percent more than its previous top bomb load — and its speed is in excess of 425 miles an hour. In power dives, it can hit a speed of 575 miles per hour.

Greatest improvements on the new model, say engineers, are the special wing flaps which enable the pilot to dive at speeds neretofore impossible. They control the flow of air below the wing without reducing the overall speed of the plane.

40,000 FOOT CEILING

In addition, the new 1-38-L has a service ceiling of 40,000 feet, a stalling speed of 75 miles an hour, mounts four .50 caliber machine guns and a 20mm. cannon all in the nose instead of the wing, and can carry rocket mountings if desired.

Used for all kinds of missions, including treetop and masthead level strafing, tank smashing, photographic reconnaissance and bomber escort work, rocket firing, and glider towing, Lockheed now claims that the new model is the most versatile of all war planes.



THE ANDRE BOOKS Germany, April 17, 1945

Western Germany was beautiful with its castle and monument topped mount-Dear Fid -ains, great forests and picturesque country side. We've come over excellent highways. Hitler's super-roadways called Reichsautobahns. Some of them are the last word in modern construction and design. We have been to a number of important places, most of which are in ruins. The city of Mainz on the Rhine was, I think the worst scene of destruction yet. Once the size of prewar San Diego, today there isn't a building in the city that isn't either totally or practically destroyed.

The number of German prisoners we are taking is fantastic. What is more fantastic is seeing German soldiers walking along the streets of the towns, wearing a white arm band denoting surrender. These, I suppose are stragglers that weren't picked up in our dash. They'll be taken care of eventual ly as soon as some outfit with facilities to do so comes along.

It is very easy to chalk up to propaganda the stories of horror and terror that come out of Germany, but this week we twice saw examples of the most horrible things imaginable. There are no words to describe or express it. We have visited two labor camps that held the Poles, Russians, French, Belgians, Czechs, Jews, German communists and yes, some Americans. Both camps are similar so a description of one is enough.

In the past three years, 200,000 have been confined in this one. None leave alive. When captured by the Americans there were some 20,000 remaining. Of that number there are 2,000 living skeletons lying on shelves in so-called barracks. They haven't the strength to move and were placed there to die. To see row on row of living dead is a sight that so sickens you it is difficult to refrain from crying and I don't mind telling you a good mony of us were croked with emotion and more than once our knees grew weak. They have been starved systematically and scientifically and a few die hourly.

The shed in back was full of naked corpses, piled on one another- the bodies of those who died that day. In another section of the camp was a huge trailer piled high with the bodies of some who had been shot. On the ground is another pile. In the building close by are great ovens, built for the expressed purpose of burning human beings. One can still see skulls, hands, legs, spines, etc. in these ovens. In the basement are huge bins piled high with human bone ash.

One man, a Belgian, took us for a tour of the camp. He told us the S.S. troops were responsible for these scenes of horror, but that 90% of the Germans were as bad. 30,000 Jews had been killed several days before the Americans arrived. His last words were, "I hope you will tell the people of Amer. ica what you have seen today." We will.

In rereading the above it sounds mild, Fid. As I say before there just aren't words to describe it.

POSTMAR FLEET LARGEST IN WORLD

(ANS) - A combat fleet three times the size of America's prewar total, to number 1,191 fighting ships, has been submitted to Congress on recommendation of the House Appropriations Committee.

The fleet would be used to control the western Atlantic and the Pacific.

The reason for the increase, it was disclosed, is that the U.S. will end the war with 1,528 combat ships, escorts, and submarines. Of these, 337 obselete ships will be scrapped or otherwise disposed.

The number of fighting ships to be retained - 1,191 - contrasts with the 342 which the nation is recorded as having shortly after Pearl Herbour.



(CNS) - Innocent attempts of seven Harvard professors to rid their lawns of crab grass blossomed into a fire bomb which is now devastating Japanese cities.

Dr. Louis Feiser was working on incendiary bombs when his grass was plagued. He decided to use fire to burn away the weed. He then tried blowtorch, kerosene, plain gasoline -- but the crab grass resisted stubbornly. Finally Feiser found a substance that thickened the gasoline until it jellied. The lawn blazed furiously and the crab grass vanished.

From that the scientist and his six assistants developed the first successful formula for transferring ordinary gasoline into a vicious incendiary jelly, resembling orange gelatin. The invention is the Army's latest fire bomb: M-69 Oil, Incendiary.
